#### 4.1 Chair's Report

She said that the Board was looking at ways of raising funds for the following year, including the proposed rise in membership fees. Mag thanked Barbara Wiesner and Lesley Beasley for their hard work.

#### 4.3 Director's Report

- -Groups that meet elsewhere to remain at \$88


#### 8. Appointment of Board members

## Chair's Report: Bronwen Webb

it is important that the

**Board remains engaged** 

in constructive discussion



he years 2008/2009 have been challenging ones with a worrying issue for the Board to deal with. During 2007, the University of Wollongong conducted a research study, commissioned by the Australia Council for the Arts (ACA),

to investigate Australia's literature infrastructure. Following the release of the research report<sup>1</sup> in July 2008, the Literature

Board recommended that ACA Key Organisation funding be available only to literature organisations that can prove they are nationally focused. All state Writers' Centres are currently receiving Key Organisation funding on a three-yearly cycle. Key Organisation funding forms 20% of the SAWC's annual funding.

Along with all Writers' Centres across Australia, the SAWC Director and Board lobbied various Arts Ministers, and responded to the ACA, objecting against the decision to "nationalise" the criteria to be a Key Organisation. However, the ACA have now moved to national Key Organisations across all arts forms and none has been successful

in lobbying against this move. If the SAWC loses its Key Organisation status in the future, which is likely unless a national focus can be proved, it has the option to submit requests for ACA funding through Program Grants or Community Partnerships.

Following on from concerns raised by members about some aspects of Writers' Week's engagement with South Australian writers, the Chair and Director met with the new Chair of Writers' Week, John Coetzee. He gave us a very good hearing and took our issues to his Committee. A response

> from the Committee has attempted to address some of our issues, while others remain. SA writers

will address these issues in their own way; however, it is important that the Board remains engaged in constructive discussion with John Coetzee and his Committee in the hope that, over time, there will be improved relations between the local writing community and Writers' Week.

During the past year, the Board has worked to further embed strong governance principles in its operations. It has reviewed the Constitution of the SAWC, benchmarking against constitutions of similar organisations and thoroughly debating each change. In our discussion tonight, Board member Ken Vincent will outline the reasoning behind each change.

The Board has noted the changes to the South Australian Occupational Health, Safety and Welfare Act which have increased the penalties and powers of

the Act. As an employer, the SAWC must of course comply with the Act. The Board has developed an occupational health, safety, welfare and injury management policy for the SAWC and staff now have procedures in place to monitor hazards and deal with them.

The SAWC is constantly looking to improve and expand its services and the appointment of a Writer-in-Residence was an initiative in 2008. Malcolm Walker's appointment to this position is already having a positive impact at the Centre. Thanks, Malcolm, for your substantial contribution to the SAWC.

Last year Barbara Wiesner, our energetic and dedicated Director, reached a milestone of 20 years with the SAWC. The Board presented Barbara with a trophy and gifts to mark the occasion. This seemed very little under the circumstances, but nothing we could give would ever thank Barbara enough for her service to the SAWC and the writers of South Australia. She has continued to demonstrate her skill, patience and determination throughout this difficult year.

SAWC staff Jude Aquilina, Lesley Beasley, Rachel Hennessy and Silvia Muscardin have continued to provide excellent support to members and the Board. We also couldn't manage without our volunteers: Doreen Spurdens (youth projects), David Mercer (research), Ann-Marie Smith (Assistant Librarian), James Ogilvy (proofreader) and Mag Merrilees and Helen Mitchell (office support). Our sincere thanks go to each of them.

I would also like to thank the members of the Board for their steadfast

commitment to the interests of the SAWC and their great assistance and advice during the year. Sean Williams, Deputy Chair, has decided not to renominate for 2009/2010 because of other commitments. Sean has served as Chair or Deputy Chair for several years and has been a tower of strength and support during that time. His commitment to the SAWC during what has been an increasingly successful and busy period of his career is greatly appreciated.

Also retiring are Anna Solding, Heather Taylor-Johnson, and Ashley Mallett. Bruce Lindsay and David Conyers were seconded to the Board for their specific skills and have subsequently retired from the Board. Continuing on for the next year are Mag Merrilees, Helen Mitchell, Ken Vincent and myself.

Thank you Barbara, Jude, Sean, Anna, Heather, Ashley, Bruce, David, Mag, Helen and Ken for your great contribution to the Board over the past year. It has been a pleasure working with you. Welcome to all new Board members elected tonight.

# Treasurer's Report: Mag Merrilees

A Writers' Centre Inc finished the 2008 year with a surplus of \$4,838. This result was achieved with the help of a one-off grant from the Premier via ArtsSA of \$10,000, half of which has been carried forward into the current year, and the other half of which offset what would otherwise have been a small loss.

Overall, both Income and Expenditure exceeded last year's levels. In particular there was increased workshop activity.

There was an apparent decrease in *Other Grants*, but this is more than offset by the inclusion of two grants in *Other Income*. These items fluctuate according to funding for specific programmes.

Since the last AGM we have implemented increases in Membership fees (as discussed at that meeting). This essential source of income has increased as planned.

Increased Administration expenditure results largely from increases in Employee Provisions (leave entitlements), in Electricity and in Rent.

The Balance Sheet for 31 December 2008 shows a decrease in Cash from \$110,523 in December 2007 to \$76,120 in December 2008. This results partly from payouts to departing staff. In addition, however, the 2007 figure was inflated by a substantial grant received in advance. The 2006 figure was \$91,057



and the 2005 figure was \$75,409. In real terms we are not as well off as previously, but our reserves are still adequate.

SAWC faces a challenge in terms of maintaining income levels in the future. The Australia Council is likely to remove our 'key organisation' status, and therefore our triennial funding after 2010, as already discussed by the Chair. If this happens we will become dependent on program funding, which generally does not provide adequately for administration and infrastructure. We will need to maintain reasonable fee levels and generate as much of our own income as possible. This requires ingenuity and lateral thinking by Board and staff. Ideas and contributions from members will be appreciated, as always!

Thanks to Barbara Wiesner and Lesley Beasley for efficient management of the SAWC finances.

## **Director's Report:**Barbara Wiesner

Constantly marvel at the amount of activity generated by the SAWC, considering we have such a small team to service an increasingly diverse membership. The following are just a few highlights of last year's activities. A complete list is included at the end of the 2008 Annual Report (pages 10-20).

In 2008 we ran a networking dinner for experienced professional writers and promoted over 130 authors at events throughout the state. For writers at the beginning of their career we held a four-day business skills course, thanks to additional support from the Australian Society of Authors; and offered residencies at Varuna. Writers of all levels were also able to attend seminars, information forums and workshops, while writing groups took part in a Groups Muster to share information on topics such as how to access grants involving the community, and on writing a constitution. Our children's program grew, thanks to volunteer Youth Projects Officer Doreen Spurdens. She was instrumental in organising three Young Writers' Nights, an online writing club, WriteByte, and two Country Kids' Workshops.

When planning the program, we're very conscious of different writing genres and endeavour to cover as many as are manageable within a year. We were therefore delighted with Stephen House's offer to open rehearsals to interested playwrights, and for the Salisbury Writers' Festival, in partnership with the City of Salisbury, to focus on popular fiction, nonfiction and writing for children. For the poets,



the City of Onkaparinga, another of our partners, devoted an entire festival: Poetry Unhinged.

Another concern for the SAWC when putting together a year's activities is the fact that our members live in many parts of South Australia, so we were pleased to help fund workshops for groups in the Barossa, Goolwa, the mid-north and Pt Lincoln. In addition, our Deputy Chair, and celebrated writer, Sean Williams spoke at the Port Augusta Writers' Festival.

An initiative in 2008 was Writer-in-Residence Malcolm Walker who was able to work on a one-to-one basis with writers with a disability thanks to funding from the Richard Llewellyn Arts and Disability Trust. Writers without disabilities can access professional feedback and support by joining workshop groups, attending educational courses and literary functions. For many of Malcolm's clients this is not possible due to difficulties in mobility, communication or confidence.

Our team saw a number of changes last year with the departure of Belinda Schenk after eight years with the Centre. Her replacement, SF writer and

marketing professional David Conyers, soon realised that a three-day-a-week job was not enough to support his family, so after three months he left. We were then extremely fortunate to have Rachel Hennessy accept the position of Communications Officer. She came with experience in arts administration and success as a writer of literary fiction. Her energy, enthusiasm and insight into writers' needs, not to mention her affable personality, had an immediate impact on the Centre's activities.

As already mentioned by the Chair, funding changes will certainly affect the Centre in the near future. However, I'm confident that our staff has the necessary skill set, determination and passion to deal with these changes. Apart from those already mentioned, our team includes the indefatigable and ever-welcoming poet Jude Aquilina, writer Lesley Beasley who is in charge of the finances, and as a volunteer helps to upgrade the database, which in turn is updated regularly by longterm volunteer David Mercer, Librarian Silvia Muscardin and her volunteer assistant Anne-Marie Smith continue to maintain an efficient and growing library of local authors' books. James Ogilvy has been indispensable in his role as resident proofreader. Richard and Jo Vabolis have generously offered their services for the maintenance of the Centre. We are also fortunate to have members Andrew Pam and Katherine Phelps skilled in the area of technical support for our computer network and design of the website.

Community support of the SA Writers' Centre has, and will continue to be, an important factor in our success.

Finally, the SAWC has been blessed with an exceptional Board which has had to deal with the politics of funding changes as well as with the overall governance of the organisation. Members worked superbly as a Board and contributed individually to many of the Centre's activities. It was indeed a pleasure working with such a resourceful team in 2008.

#### Longlines Fellowship

Our partnership with Varuna, the national Writers' Centre based in NSW's Blue Mountains, continued in 2008, thanks to support from the Macquarie Bank Foundation. **Stephen Orr** was selected for the 2008 South Australian Varuna Residency and spent two weeks at Varuna in January. **Kim Mann** was accepted into the Poetry Workshop. Longlines non-residential readings and consultations were offered to **Abbie Thomas** and **Jane Jolly**.



Thanks to this partnership with Varuna, two South Australian authors who were involved in the program in 2006 had book launches in April 2009: **Siew Siang Tay's** novel, *Handpicked*, was published by HarperCollins Publishers Australia and **Kimberley Mann's** book of poetry, *Awake During Anaesthetic*, was published by the Australian Poetry Centre as part of The National New Poets Program.



#### **Funding Information Sessions**

Representatives from Arts SA, the Literature Board of the Australia Council and CAL (Copyright Agency Limited) held information sessions at the SAWC in February and March 2008. Paul Rees from Arts SA attracted 24 participants; Josie Emery from the Literature Board and Susan Hayes, the Manager of Copyright Agency Limited's Cultural Fund, held 4 and 3 individual consultations respectively. Susan also spoke to 36 writing group members attending the Writing Groups' Muster (see page 14).



#### Forum:

The On-line Revolution Author and e-learning consultant, Ian Bone, and Amanda Hassett from V Media spoke to a group of 13 about the latest trends in the way writers are using the on-line world.



#### Seminars

Tips on Getting Your Work Published

Literary agent Lyn Tranter from Australian Literary Management\* and Publisher Jane Palfreyman\* from Allen and Unwin spoke to 36 attendees at a seminar. They also broke into two small group sessions to allow for more interaction. (\* in partnership with the University of Adelaide's Creative Writing Program)

#### Successful Self-publishing

This session provided an excellent overview of different methods of self-publishing. 34 people attended. Guest speakers sharing their experiences included: Bruce Lindsay, Jill Gloyne, Jenny Opie and, from Seaview Press, Stephanie Luke, Milton Haseloff and Glen Woodward.

Writer-in-Residence for Writers with a Disability Thanks to funding from the Richard Llewellyn Arts and Disability Trust, the SAWC was able to appoint **Malcolm Walker** as Writer-in-Residence to work on a one-to-one basis with writers who have a disability.

Malcolm began in September 2008 working two days per fortnight: giving editorial advice, providing reading reports, researching for his clients, answering writer-related questions and liaising with the arts and disability sector. The service was so popular that, within a few months, Malcolm had over 40 clients. For most of these



clients this is the first time they have had professional help with their work. Writers without disabilities can access professional feedback and support by joining workshop groups, attending educational courses and literary functions.

The program has been extremely successful in developing networks of support, improving writing skills and finding outlets for participants' work. Additional funding is being sought to continue the program.

A networking function was held at the Feathers' Hotel in November. Sixty-five writers were able to meet and interact on an informal basis with five special guests. They were:

An extremely successful Writing Groups' Muster was held over a weekend in March 2008. Thirty-six people attended the Saturday session and twenty took part on Sunday. #### **Poetry Unhinged Festival**

#### Storybook Walk at Thalassa Park

Artworks by South Australian artists, based on much-loved Australian characters and poems, were unveiled on the Storybook Walk in Thalassa Park. New works, including Banjo Paterson's *Mulga Bill's Bicycle* and C J Dennis's **The Circus**, created by artist David Archer, were added to the four existing pieces. They will be popular additions to the park, proudly supported by the Thalassa Parks and Garden Trust.

#### Poets on Parade

Amelia Walker, Peter Chapman and Elizabeth Mansutti brought poetry to life for around 550 students in nine primary schools throughout the City of Onkaparinga and the Fleurieu Peninsula.

#### Library Events

The six City of Onkaparinga libraries conducted a variety of sessions about poetry. **30**<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of Friendly Street Poets at the Arts Centre, Port Noarlunga **Friendly Street Poets** hosted a special reading at the Arts Centre in Port Noarlunga to celebrate the launch of *Best of Friends: the first 30 years of the Friendly Street Poets*. A number of poets included in *Best of Friends* read their work, followed by an open reading that gave local poets a great opportunity to showcase their own writing in front of an appreciative audience.

#### Playing with Poetry Tour

**Janeen Brian** introduced poetry to 130 children, visiting eight preschools on the Playing with Poetry tour.

#### Bush Poets Bonanza at Amande B&B

Local bush poet **Peter Chapman** hosted an 'Aussie evening' of bush poetry featuring three of SA's top bush poets: **Anne Rogers, Tim Strauss** and **Maurie O'Brien**. Virtuoso guitarist and singer **Chris Finnen** completed the line-up, which entertained an audience of around 100.

#### Country Kids' Workshops






#### Write Club: The First Rule

A group of five young writers under twenty-five years of age met regularly to devise activities to support young teenage writers. The culmination of their efforts was an afternoon of readings and word games in October at the SAWC.

#### The WriteByte Club

Following many requests over the years to build on the enthusiasm created by the Young Writers' Nights, the SAWC proposed a series of writing clubs in schools. However, with too many hurdles to overcome and, following much consultation, a new model evolved: an on-line writers' club, membership of which is open only to participants in the Young Writers' Night program or students who have been referred by Writers' Centre members.



WriteByte — www.sawc.org.au/writebyte — went live on 2 November and has proved a success beyond all expectations! By the end of 2008, WriteByte had over 80 members from 50 different schools. Of these, 11 were country schools. Almost 300 pieces of writing have been posted.

#### School Visits

Prince Alfred College brought 24 gifted and talented students from Years 3 to 5 to the SAWC for a series of workshops by **Jude Aquilina**, **Laurie Anderson** and **Amelia Walker**. Teachers then invited poet John Malone to the school to continue developing students' enthusiasm for writing.

Forty-five Year 12 students from Valley View High School came to the SAWC for two short workshops by **Jude Aquilina** and an introductory session about the SAWC by **Barbara Wiesner**, Director.

#### 6. SUNDRIES

- ◆Membership rose from 1,105 to 1171 in 2008.
- ◆A total of 30 book launches were held at the SA Writers' Centre in 2008 – 10 more than the previous year.
- ◆Eleven editions of *Southern Write*, the Centre's newsletter, were produced in 2008, and mail updates were regularly sent to members each month and occasionally twice a month.
- ◆A total of 22 member groups used the SA Writers' Centre as their meeting space. An additional 25 groups met in metropolitan and country regions.
- ◆A successful Quiz Night was enjoyed by around 100 members and friends.
- ◆Two stand-up comedians used the SAWC for their FRINGE shows which featured their original material.
- ◆The SAWC supported PEN, Wet Ink, Australian Business Arts Foundation and the Arts Industry Council by providing its venue free of charge.
- ◆The Centre's library received 195 books, all of which were donated by members.
- ◆Six writers have been using the Centre regularly for their quiet writing space.
- ◆SAWC's expertise has been sought by librarians from the Cities of Onkaparinga, Unley, Burnside, Port Adelaide and Enfield, and Seaford Libraries.
- ♦ Meetings were held following a suggestion by Ian Bone that the SAWC investigate establishing on-line writing workshops. Sadly, the idea has had to be postponed, primarily due to high costs.

- ◆The SAWC offered a prize for a secondary student winner in the English Teachers' Association Spring Poetry Competition, High Achievement in the Professional Writing Course at the Adelaide Institute of TAFE and for the Burnside Library crime writing competition (paid for by the library).
- ♦ A series of interviews were taped at the SAWC by Community TV Channel 31. Guests included Jude Aquilina, Amelia Walker, Martin Johnson, Steve Evans, Peter O'Leary and Betty Collins. Unfortunately, due to poor sound quality, they could not be aired.
- **♦**The SAWC partnered the following events during 2008:
  - o Mental Health Week, at which the SAWC ran a poetry competition, judged by Jude Aquilina. The Centre also hosted the award ceremony compered by Channel 10's Mark Aiston and attended by more than 50 people. SAWC member Helen Maczkowiack gave the keynote address.
  - o The 2008 International Women's Day Young Women Writers' Anthology which was launched by the Hon. Gail Gago at the SA Writers' Centre in December 2008.
  - The Feast Gay and Lesbian
     Festival which held an extremely successful reading at the SAWC.
  - o 'Love Poetry, Hate Racism', organised by Amelia Walker, attracted 60 people during National Poetry Week.
