The Joy and the Fear: Writing Queer Lives

What does it mean to be LGBTQI* or non-gender-binary? How does it shape a person's life? And how do we write about that experience?

This workshop will explore the powerful decisions that queer folk make (the ones that heterosexuals don't have to): coming-out, not coming-out, the labels, the challenges, the oppression, living 'out'. Covering love sex and more, it will give you an overview of what other writers have said, examine the ethics and politics of this writing, and provide practical writing advice.

Participants will learn to:

- position your writing in relation to existing LGBTQI and N-G-B writing
- identify the way labels and identity are used by queer folk and others
- identify the personal challenges with particular aspects of this writing
- identify the ethics and pitfalls of writing 'real life' in this genre
- explore writing possibilities ranging from first-person memoir to third-person fiction.

Margaret (Mag) Merrilees' second novel, *Take Big Rough Stones*, will be published this year. In 2012 her debut novel, *The First Week*, won the Wakefield Press Unpublished Manuscript Award. After publication it was shortlisted for a Barbara Jefferis Award, a NSW Premier's Literary Award, and the Onkaparinga People's Choice Award. In 2014, Wakefield Press published her *Fables Queer & Familiar*, illustrated by Chia Moan. A second volume will appear this year. The Fables started life as a blog and were also broadcast as a radio serial. Mag's short work has appeared in *Meanjin*, *Griffith Review* and *Island*.

His work has been featured by *Overland, New Matilda, New Internationalist, Australian Book Review, RealTime, The Lifted Brow,* and *Daily Review.* Ben was a featured playwright at the Emerging Writers' Festival Adelaide Roadshow in September 2014, and at the National Play Festival in Adelaide in July 2015. His most recently produced work for the stage was the dystopian triptych This Storm (which he also directed), a critical and commercial success at the 2016 Adelaide Fringe Festival. He is currently an inaugural Sydney Review of Books Emerging Critics Fellow.
