WORKSHOP LEADERS



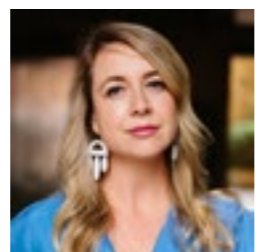
Edoardo Crismani is the Coordinator of the South Australian First Nations Writers Group. A descendant of the Wiradjuri people, Edoardo is a singer-songwriter, filmmaker, poet and short story writer who is currently working on

his first novel manuscript. Seven of his films have screened on NITV and are available to view on SBS on Demand including his hour-long documentary about his grandfather, *The Panther Within*, for which he was nominated for an Australian Writers Guild Award in 2017. His short documentary *Lest We Forget*, Aboriginal Women screened nationwide on Remembrance Day 2018. He most recently directed *Deadly Family Portraits: Crombie Crew* for ABC TV and iview.



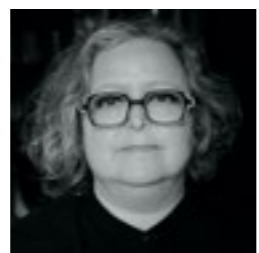
Claire G. Coleman is a Noongar woman whose family have belonged to the south coast of Western Australia since long before history started being recorded. She writes fiction, essays, poetry and art writing, was awarded a Black&Write!

Indigenous Writing Fellowship her novel *Terra Nullius*. Since mid 2020 Claire has been a member of the cultural advisory committee for Agency, a Not-for-profit Indigenous arts Consultancy.



Rebecca Giggs is an author from Perth, Australia, where she writes on Noongar Whadjuk country. Her work has appeared in *The Atlantic*, the *New York Times Magazine*, *Granta*, and in anthologies including *Best Australian Essays* and *Best*

Australian Science Writing. Rebecca's nonfiction focuses on how people feel towards animals in a time of technological and ecological change. Her first book *Fathoms: The World in the Whale* (2020) won the Mark and Evette Moran Nib Prize and the Whitley Award for Popular Zoology, and it is shortlisted for the ALA Andrew Carnegie Medal for Excellence in Nonfiction in the US.



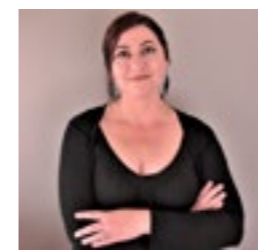
Krissy Kneen is the author of the best-selling memoir *Affection*, the novels *Steeplechase*, *Triptych*, *The Adventures of Holly White* and the Incredible Sex Machine, the Thomas Shapcott Award winning poetry collection *Eating My*

Grandmother and *An Uncertain Grace*, shortlisted for the Stella Prize, the Norma K Hemming Award and the Aurealis awards. *Wintering*, her latest novel has been longlisted for the Colin Roderick Award and shortlisted for the Davitt Award and the Qld Literary Award for both fiction and a work of state significance. She is currently developing two TV series with STAN and a feature film with Like a Photon.



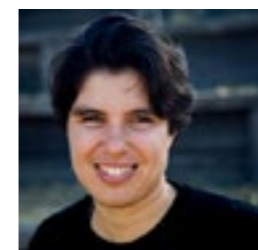
Margot McGovern is a Young Adult author whose work is influenced by children's classics, myths and faery tales. Her debut novel *Neverland* (Penguin Random House Aus.) was shortlisted for the 2020 Adelaide Festival Awards for Literature, and

an early version of the manuscript was shortlisted for the 2015 Text Prize. Margot holds a creative writing Ph.D. from Flinders University. She is also a book reviewer, occasional blogger and current member of the LoveOzYA Committee.



Alexandra Nahlous is a freelance editor who specialises in fiction and narrative non-fiction. With over twenty years' publishing experience, she has worked in-house as a senior editor and fiction publisher, taught editing at UTS, and presented information sessions and workshops for

Ellen van Neerven (they/them) is an award-winning author, editor and educator of Mununjali (Yugambah language group) and Dutch heritage. They write fiction, poetry, and non-fiction, and play football on unceded Turrbal and Yuggera land. van Neerven's first book, *Heat and Light* (UQP, 2014),

a novel-in-stories, was the recipient of the David Unaipon Award, the Dobbie Literary Award and the NSW Premier's Literary Awards Indigenous Writers Prize. van Neerven's poetry collection *Comfort Food* (UQP, 2016) won the Tina Kane Emergent Award and was shortlisted for the NSW Premier's Literary Awards Kenneth Slessor Prize. *Throat* (UQP, 2020), van Neerven's latest poetry collection, and recipient of the inaugural Quentin Bryce Award, is now available.



Victoria Purman is an Australian Top Ten and USA Today bestselling fiction author. Her bestselling *The Land Girls* was published in April 2019. *The Last of the Bonegilla Girls*, a novel based on her mother's postwar migration to Australia, was

published in 2018. Her previous novel *The Three Miss Allens* became a USA Today bestseller in April 2019. Her next novel, *The Women's Pages*, was published in September 2020. She is a regular guest at writers festivals, is a workshop presenter and was a judge in the fiction category for the 2018 Adelaide Festival Awards for Literature.



Graeme Simson is the author of five novels, all international bestsellers, including *The Rosie Project* which was Australian Book Industry Association Book of the Year for 2014. He was a latecomer to fiction after a career in

technology, management, research and teaching in which he was a regular presenter at international conferences and ran masterclasses around the world, and even then took a detour via screenwriting. His PhD looked at creativity in the context of technical work, but he draws on what he learned there every day. He lives in Melbourne with his wife, Anne Buist, an author in her own right, and they have written two novels together.



Dan Thorsland is an editor, writer, video and film producer, who contributed to *Superwoman*, *Wonder Woman* and *Star Wars* comic series when he worked for DC and Dark Horse. Dan will work with the Teen Writers to help them understand the basics of

how to tell stories using words, pictures and interaction. In 2001 he migrated to Adelaide from New York, and began his second career as a video game and visual effects producer. Here he has worked as a producer at KOJO, Ratbag, Krome, Rising Sun Pictures and most recently was General Manager of Mighty Kingdom, Australia's largest independent game studio.



Sean Williams is an award-winning, #1 New York Times bestselling author of forty-nine novels and over one hundred and twenty short stories for adults, young adults and children. As well as his original fiction, he has contributed to shared universes

such as *Star Wars* and *Doctor Who* and collaborated with Garth Nix. His 2019 novel *Impossible Music* was shortlisted for the Ethel Turner Prize for Young People's Literature and listed as a Notable Book by the Children's Book Council of Australia. His latest novel is *Her Perilous Mansion*, a tale of two children trying to escape from a haunted house.



Michelle Prak aka Prakky, is a PR consultant who has worked with leading South Australian brands to gain and manage media coverage. She teaches PR at the University of South Australia and is also the indie author of three rom-com novels. Two novels are

set within the media industry.
